
hile my studies were in the production side of media, I started my career on the marketing side of things.

First in the advertising department of *Xtra*, then a 12-year stint as the head of *The Pink Pages Directory*, followed by two years as business and advertising manager at *fab*, before returning to "The Pink Pages Directory."

Throughout this whole time I was watching and learning the production side of things. Upon my return to the *Directory*, I negotiated that I would also be allowed to produce a magazine, and that I would have full control of its direction and content. I was more than ecstatic to get the green light. I started getting editors, writers, and photographers all excited and on board, and pitching it to potential advertisers.

I had a lot of ideas to create with a different kind of magazine - a bright, happy, inclusive, diverse, and affirming magazine. We ran with a team around downtown, doing photo shoots, staying up into the night writing and editing, and then designing the look of it. Two editions were produced, one for the holiday season/winter called "Holigay!" and the other for summer called "Summerplay!". I was incredibly thrilled and proud of how warmly they were both received by the community.

That was when I decided it was time to leave work in the community media, and start my own marketing and advertising agency. Two years into the business, the past publisher of *The Pink Pages*



Directory approached me to take over the business. Part of that acquisition were the files for the first incarnation of the *PinkPlayMags* brand, which included the two magazines I had already produced, and my conceptual notes for future issues. At that time I was feeling that I really wanted to get back into community media, so I decided to relaunch *PinkPlayMags*. The rest as they say is history.

I am indeed living one of my dreams with *PinkPlayMags*. I love being part of a collective. A magazine is a product of many minds and ideas. I get to work with writers who write about issues and people, things that matter for our community, about our history, issues and thoughts, along with the fun and always positive reading fare. I also get to work with amazing photographers who produce stunning covers, an Editor-in-Chief who pulls it all together, and an Art Director who makes it all look fantastic. Finally, a great Production Manager who makes sure everything gets done on time. I get to be a little part of all of that.

We are honoured to have earned the love and respect from our community over the years, and our current place in local queer publishing history as one of the longest-standing published magazines!

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

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LGBTQ2S+ representation has come a long way, after near erasure by the mainstream media for decades.

During the Cold War, the federal government set forth a policy to identify and remove all LGBTQ2S+people from military and government positions. The "LGBT Purge" started with violent arrests, public-shaming, and a complete disregard for the dignity of its subjects. The purge expanded to various individuals from marginalized communities, and even frightfully continued after homosexuality was decriminalized in 1969.

Queer artists had to change their names and code their work or risk the public attacking them for indecency. At this time, many queers felt it was necessary to assimilate into heteronormative culture in order to have access to high-powered jobs and elite services. Many queer writers started writing fan fiction or 'zines because they could take ownership of their favourite characters and turn them into something that resembled their very real or desired

romantic and sexual experiences. It also allowed queer people to share their artwork and create a network with other like-minded people.

Decades later LGBTQ2S+ visibility had reached an all-time high with a record number of queers in power positions within the publishing industry. These ground-breaking storytellers were able to push through the rigid barriers to begin creating complex stories of authentic queer experiences. Let's look back at some of Canada's queer publications that spoke to our community, and often were a lifeline for many young queer kids.

In 1970, **Ian Young** started *Catalyst Press*, which was the first gay publishing company in Canada, and it produced queer works of fiction and poetry until 1980. Young was also a regular columnist at *The Body Politic Gay Liberation Journal* from 1975 – 1985, and for the adult gay magazine, *Torso* from 1991 – 2008. His crowning achievements may be his work as editor for the queer anthology *The Gay Muse* (1973), and the biography *The Male Homosexual in Literature* (1975).

Jearld Moldenhauer created *The Body Politic* which was one of the first gay magazines in Canada. The activism-based publication ran from 1971 – 1987.

This vital magazine gave a voice to the queer community and created a space for gay and lesbian people to exist on their own terms. Moldenhauer also opened and managed the *GLAD Day Bookshop*, and in 1973 he began the groundwork for the *Canadian Lesbian and Gay Archives*.

A brief time later, *The Body Politic* editorial members officially formed the *Canadian Lesbian and Gay Archives*, which is known as the largest archive concerning LGBTQ2S+ people that is produced in or associated with Canada.

Then in a switch of names, *The Body Politic* editorial members chose to incorporate as *Pink Triangle Press* in 1975. Two years later, the police charged the magazine with publishing obscene materials in the article "*Men Loving Boys Loving Men*," written by **Gerald Hannon**. By 1982, the police charged the magazine again for publishing obscene materials when they ran an article on fisting called "*Lust with a Very Proper Stranger*," written by **Angus MacKenzie**. After international outcry, the magazine was acquitted on both accounts, and the stolen materials seized by the police in 1977 were eventually returned to the magazine in 1985.

In Halifax, Nova Scotia, a collective came together to produce a local community newsletter called *Gaezette* in 1983. The publication served the LGBTQ+ community in the Atlantic region. By 1995, the committee rebranded the magazine as *Wayves* and moved online as of 2012.

In 1984, *Pink Triangle Press* founded *Xtra!* This queer magazine expanded the original publishing mandate to include more members on the sexual and gender spectrums. The idea was to gather relevant cultural events and exciting lifestyle stories in one publication. By 1993 they launched their sister editions: *Xtra! West* (Vancouver) and *Capital Xtra!* (Ottawa). These magazines remained in print until 2015 and continue to publish stories online.

By 1994, *No Fear Publishing* launched *fab* which was a bi-weekly magazine primarily focused on the gay party scene, and eventually it expanded its themes and distribution across Canada. The magazine hosted regular articles by **Rolyn Chambers**, **Paul Bellini**, **Brad Fraser**, **Nina Arsenault**, and **Heroine Marks**. Famous for provocative cover photos and steamy inside picture galleries, it often featured

celebrities, local politicians, and international musicians. In 2008, *Pink Triangle Press* bought *fab*, but the publication was discontinued in 2013 due to downsizing efforts.


A women's collective launched the monthly magazine *Siren* in 1995, and it ran until 2004. Readers may remember *Siren* for publishing articles advocating for just cases, including extending rights for trans people. Noted contributors to the magazine include **Billie Jo Newman**, **Debra Anderson**, and **Sheila Cavanagh**.

In 2007, *INspired Media* started publishing PinkPlayMags, that produces creative content by LGBTQ2S+ writers, with aspirational images by top-notch photographers. The collective of associates also produce *The Pink Pages Directory* linking us to community-based businesses. In 2014, *INspired Media* began producing *theBUZZ* that focuses on creative essays, intellectual articles, and curated events, such as off-the-beaten-path performances and frequently visited hot-spots.

<u>GAYLETTER</u> magazine began in 2008 as a weekly newsletter to spread the word on exciting community events for queer people. By 2014, they launched a printed magazine containing artist interviews, stunning videos, provocative photos, and exciting articles on post-gay life (whatever that means).

Phil Villeneuve (former editor of *fab* magazine, and former arts editor at *Xtrat*!) and **Armand Digdoyo** (art director and event producer) teamed up to co-create *Yohomo* in 2016. The duo brought a fresh vibe to Toronto event coverage, proudly presenting diverse queer culture and shining the spotlight on local talent. They continue to bridge the gap between the non-traditional queer spaces and the always popular Church Street events. They are also quite active on social media providing creative blogs, *Spotify* playlists, radio shows, and photography galleries.

In 2017, the *Canadian Lesbian and Gay Archives* officially recognized inequalities within the LGBTQ2S+ community including the collecting and protecting of stories by people of colour. Now rebranded as *The ArQuives*, they are following through on a five-year plan to build up the work of marginalized communities and preserve their stories.



The ArQuives is a fantastic resource to deep dive into the artwork of the LGBTQ2S+ community and all of the wonderful queer artists that led the way for us to infiltrate all media. You can get involved by volunteering or simply visit the building and look through the collections.

2021 brought us the publication *lstw*, a magazine dedicated to producing work by and for lesbian, bisexual, trans, and queer women to change the narrative around these people and produce positive role models for the next generation.

As the presence of the LGBTQ2S+ community continues to grow in mainstream media, we must continue to fight for truthful representation. Luckily, the next generation of storytellers are resolved in their self-worth and fluid with their identity, often choosing not to be placed in sexual categories or gender boxes. We are moving past telling traumatic

stories of coming out to a judgemental world and looking toward a world of detailed adventures.

As we reach critical success and are lifted to the next career platform, we must remember to hold our hands out to lift-up the next generation of queer storytellers, so that the future can represent all stories from people who are traditionally suppressed or ignored.




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CONCEPT

To understand the content of PinkPlayMags we need to look at the concept. We set out from the getgo to create a very different, unique, and hadn't been done before queer magazine. It needed to be diverse, inclusive, and representative of our community. We wanted to feature intelligent writing framed with beautiful visuals, and we wanted every reader to feel there was something in it for them. We, the editorial team, agreed that we will touch on many topics, some serious and difficult, others fluffy and just for fun, but always positive, affirming, and hopeful. Each year we decided on a theme that would dictate our covers, main features, and inspire our travel, fiction (rarely included in any other mags these days), along with our regular columns.

EDITORIAL

The year 2012, the end of the world as per the Mayan calendar, featured a very ambitious theme (and cover photography) that journeyed into the future of our world in food supply, personal health, religion, and instead of doom and gloom of an ending world, we imagined a new beginning. In 2016, we took a look at the different stages of life, and how specifically they affect a queer person. The following year we

revisited our community history spanning the last six decades, and then imagined the future of our community in the wrap-up issue. Then, in 2019 we spent looking at queer contributions to cinema, with covers inspired by much loved movies, re-imagined with queer titles and characters.

THE COVERS

Over the years PinkPlayMags worked with a number of talented photographers and illustrators in our community and produced some of the most memorable covers in the history of queer publishing in Toronto. The covers featured many of our community's most beloved personalities, paired with creative storylines and themes. It is by design that the team invited the community to be part of the covers; the magazine was meant to be distinctively queer and very relatable to our local community. It is no small feat to produce a PinkPlayMags cover. They are usually planned months in advance, with an idea coming from the imagination of our publisher before being vetted and planned with the team. Sometimes the themes are simple, other times it is a beautiful illustration, or focused on a singular member of our community featured in theme. But it is the big ideas that involve several characters, filming on location,



a makeup crew, and sometimes extremely elaborate costumes, that we had such a blast producing.

Like the time we did an issue celebrating the burlesque community (see above). We photographed a cover and a photo essay at a luxury venue with a fabulous burlesque troupe, a drag artist, a dancer, and additional members of our community. This was the result of a 12-hour day.

Or the time we gathered a big number of community individuals and drag artists, got them all hot and bothered, and filmed at a bath house's locker room, including the whirlpool. You should see the steamy



inside cover, go run check it out under our archives section on our website, you will thank us later.

In one instance we put a drag artist and a bunch of lovely community people in leather and filmed at a REAL LIFE torture and fantasy chamber owned by a downtown Toronto dominatrix (we got gossip some famous stars had been clients of the venue). This was "the MONSTER issue" because it was a monster to shoot but we LOVED it.



Filming in black-and-white in the penthouse of the Sheraton Centre Toronto Hotel and also in the lobby, and on a grand staircase for the cover and






photo essay in that issue was quite an adventure. It included several people playing various characters, a full wardrobe that needed to look like the Golden Age of cinema, and a makeup team.



There was that time when we worked with a Bollywood dance troupe and we filmed at an abandoned railway. We adore this colourful cover, and everyone had such a good time that day. (See above.)

Another one of our favourite creations is when we worked with a talented comic book illustrator and photographer to produce a mixed media cover for our "The Geek Issue". The characters drawn on the cover is the actual team of *PinkPlayMags*. To the side you'll see the real life and beloved community staple





Sonia ID-ing our publisher at the door of a space bar reminiscent of "Fly."


Another time we tried our hand at mixed media cover, is when we celebrated **WorldPride** 2014. The energetic and happy team at Pride Toronto posed in an animated city to welcome the world. (*See above.*)

"A Community Thanksgiving feast" will always be a thanksgiving to remember, with **George Smitherman** (then running for Toronto Mayor) at the head of the table. Community members Michael and Keith generously invited our crew into their home for a feast prepared by **Chef Chris Schroer**. We truly had a wonderful time.

THE PHOTO ESSAY

Several editions over the years featured photo essays that were an extension of the cover and amplified the editorial theme of the issue.

These were big projects to develop, with a lot of details that needed to all be addressed before we got to the location. As mentioned before in the article,

the cover and photo essay (titled "Burlesque: The Story of Cherie!) for The Burlesque Issue took a 12-hour day to film. We have many favourites in the photo essay department, but these would be our favourite three:

The Holden Affair: The black and white cinema noir story of Mr. and Mrs. Holden, the richest folks in town back in the early 20's and their "query" frolics with the help. This story was featured in The LUXURY Issue in 2010 and continued in part two in the Winter 2015 edition.

The Monster & The Master: This spooky story of the monster who loves the sweet pain of torture, appeared in The MONSTER Issue in 2010, and continued in autumn 2015 with "Monster: Love, Pain, and Blood."

N.E.R.D.: Or Nerd's Emergency Recreational Dimension. This story of James, who struggled with being bullied at school, but at night with the help of his friend Sonia, escaped this world through a portal, where he served as bartender at a space alien cantina, was based on a concept by then editor-inchief Jeff Harrison, with story and art by J. Bone. The story appeared in The GEEK Issue 2010, and later continued in spring 2015 edition with "N.E.R.D. Takes Flight" with creative direction this time by our publisher Antoine Elhashem and story and art by T.M. Royle. In the continuation we find our hero having an accident in the lab, and becoming a bully fighting super hero.

THE FUTURE

For 13 years, *PinkPlayMags* was published in glossy print. In the last two years we transitioned to an online downloadable edition, however the community spirit, content, and creative presentation remains the same. We look forward to continuing the journey with you for many years to come.

15 years, 15 themes, and we hope many more to come.







BUILT-IN BEAUTY





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ravel is a most wonderful thing.
We get to leave our daily routines behind and take off on a new and exciting adventure.

Whether that be by plane, train, vehicle, boat, or even bicycle, the journey is always part of the travel experience. Some prefer the more relaxed beach resort vacation, while others opt for the more active holiday experience. Whichever you choose, let it be something that makes that coveted time away from work the most memorable and pleasurable.

Upon researching to write this piece that's reflective of the Looking Back theme celebrating the 15th anniversary of *PinkPlayMags*, I came to realize that I've been writing this travel column since *winterplay!* 2010. That's 12 years to the date of this *winterplay!* issue. I took it upon myself to go back through each issue to see all the places and topics that I had written about over the years, and there were many!

I've included a snapshot review of my past articles below, with the full articles all available to read within our Archives, My first travel piece was titled When Exotic Meets Erotic where I covered several different experiences to be found, from sleeping inside Quebec City's Ice Hotel, to the warm pampering of a Haramara Holistic Retreat. This truly shows the gamut of travel options that can fulfill most any desire.

In 2011, I got to interview several comedians to find out about their travel experiences when touring, I covered Pride celebrations across Canada both big and small, traced the steps of our queer past, and looked at the burgeoning *Queerlesque* scene in North America. 2012 was predicted as the year the world would end (again). That didn't stop us from travelling. I covered green tourism in the USA, took the train to a spa in Ontario, highlighted global spirituality treks, and chatted with community members about their best travel experiences.

In 2013, I wrote about cycle tourism, camping and cottaging, discovering Niagara Falls, and shuffling off to Buffalo just across the border to see how that city is reinventing itself. In 2014, I brought readers an update on Montreal's gay happenings, as well as Kingston's gay scene, along with the fairy-tale destination of Niagara-on-the-Lake. For the winter issue, we did a special Toronto WorldPride edition.

This would also be Jeff Harrison's last issue as Editorin-Chief after seven years at the helm, before passing the reigns to me the following year.

The Spring 2015 issue was the first in my new role, and one of my favourite years writing the travel column. I began with my wonderful journeys to Israel, and also covered both Saskatoon and Warkworth (Ontario), each a pleasant surprise as to how queer friendly these smaller destinations were. One of the more interesting pieces I wrote was titled, Vampires, Witches, and Psychics, covering New Orleans, Salem, and Cassadaga, each unique in their own mystical ways.

2016 found me discovering our local area offerings in a piece titled, The 6 and The 905, as well as Philadelphia's Pride and Politics, Puerto Vallarta's gay mecca, and the wonderful region of Galicia, Spain. In 2017, it was all about Canada, spotlighting Ottawa, Winnipeg, Halifax, and an interesting look at the future of train travel across the country. In 2018 I went to **Detroit**, the birthplace of *Motown*, to discover how that city is now one of the fastest growing after years of decline. I also attended the inaugural Caribbean Pride festivities, and bounced between both Memphis and Nashville, two of the greatest cities for music. This was also the year we began publishing our annual Autumn Travel Supplement, with the first being a list of Top 5 Gay-Friendly Travel Destinations.

In 2019, I visited both **Croatia** and **Slovenia**, two underrated countries that I highly recommend visiting. It was also the year **New York City** hosted *WorldPride*, one of the largest to date. I also did a driving trip through **South Florida** that included much of The Keys, including **Key West**. The supplement spotlighted *Tips To Stay Fit While Travelling*, among other things.

In the new decade of the 20s I began with a comparison of Ontario's two theatre towns, **Stratford** and Shaw (**Niagara-on-the-Lake**). The world then took a travel pause as we navigated an unprecedented pandemic. That still didn't completely halt travel however, instead it brought the focus to travelling local, with pieces on both **Ontario** and **Toronto**. Appropriately, the supplement was titled, *Travelling During a Pandemic*.



2021 was more of the same, with long distance travel highly discouraged. I remained focused on local and began with a piece titled *The Future of Travel*. I also covered what Kingston has to offer, and what winter adventures can be found right here in Ontario. The supplement covered *Food & Beverage, Travel Tips*, and more. Finally, in 2022 we continued onward with more local experiences, as well as a focus on health and wellness, as we began recovery out of the pandemic. The Brilliant Darkness of December

In the summer of 1969, we returned to Canada from two back-to-back diplomatic postings of my father's, in Beirut and Havana respectively.

I was seven years old, and I'd never seen snow.

That summer, on a black and white television at the Savoy Hotel in Ottawa, I watched Neil Armstrong and Buzz Aldrin walk on the moon.

To my eyes, this new country I'd been told was "home" was already not scarce of miracles.

That autumn, the leaves on the trees lining the street of our new house exploded into brilliant sourball colours I'd never seen in Lebanon or Cuba—scarlet, orange, vibrant yellow. I was as drunk with colour as a child could be.

One morning in early December, I woke to a curious pearl-grey light on my bedroom floor. The world outside my window was miraculously bleached white with heavily falling snow.

My breath caught in my throat. I'd never seen anything so beautiful in my life. I wanted to swim in it.

A few weeks later, the Christmas lights went up and the spell was cast. They were pink, green, red, blue, yellow, and orange. These were colours that would have been



incongruous in any other context but Christmas.

My mother baked cookies and frosted them with almond flavoured frosting in the same colours as the lights.

At night, the reflection of those lights on the Ottawa snow lit our street like something out of a fairy tale.

In those perfect weeks before that first Christmas, as the snow fell, there was no doubt in my mind about the reality of letters to Santa Claus, or reindeer, or cookies that disappeared on Christmas Eve, or the Baby Jesus, or any number of other miracles. We celebrated a secular Christmas, but also an ecumenical one, in a way.

I slept as deeply as the boy in Dylan Thomas' "A Child's Christmas in Wales," and my dreams were just as sweet.

All the Christmases of my childhood—in Ottawa, then later in Switzerland, then back in Ottawa—were special in their own

way, but none were as perfect as the one in 1969. And I always looked for the lights.

As a teenager those lights welcomed me home from boarding school. They lit the snow like jewels outside the windows of the car as I drove home from Christmas shopping with my girlfriend. Christmas became for falling in love.

Later, as an older queer teenager, girlfriends were replaced by unrequited crushes on boys, but Christmas was still for falling in love.

I grew up. I moved away from home.

But every December, somewhere, the lights took me home, to the beauty of dreams that always seemed more accessible in darkest December than at any other time in the year.

I grew older. My parents grew old. As adults do, we spent Christmases apart. I had my own life, with my own husband, and my own family-of-the-heart, including wonderful godchildren through whose eyes I was able to relive that seasonal magic a bit.

But there were always phone calls on Christmas Day to my parents. It seemed natural, and it was always a tiny little bit like time travel

My mother, who loved Christmas like no one I've ever known, died in 2000. My father, who found new love with a wonderful woman named Sarah in the years he lost my mother, died in 2017. Dad never cared about Christmas, but Sarah did, so in a way, that circle of holiday lights remained unbroken.

Today I am far closer to the age my parents were when I lost them than any of the years of my childhood, youth, or young adulthood.

For the past twenty-odd years, we've spent Christmases in Palm Springs with my best friend Ron and his family. Ron is as close to me as a brother, and he loves Christmas like I do—like his own mother always did, as mine did.

People ask me if I don't miss snow when I'm in California. Wryly, I tell them that we all miss snow in this dangerously warming world.

But they really mean, "Don't you miss Christmas?"

I tell them no. And here's why:

Because at night in the desert, in winter, the darkness is brilliant. For some reason, it carries light better than anywhere else on earth.

And every Christmas Eve, I can see those jewel-tone lights glittering, almost for miles.

And for a moment, despite my receding hairline, my softening body, or my failing eyesight, I'm a child again—the Americans have just landed on the moon, my first snow is falling like a thousand angels wings all around our house in Ottawa, and the lights are like something out of a dream.

Time is a wheel.

And as long as I can still feel the child's heart leap in my adult's body in that moment, there's only ever been one Christmas.


And it's now.

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Troy Brooks is a contemporary Canadian painter who over the past decade has made his mark on the pop surrealist art world.

With no formal art education, he's garnered international attention for his exhibitions in Paris, New York, San Francisco, London, Australia, Germany, Toronto, and Los Angeles. Some of his illustrations were actually included in the very first issue of *Pink Play Mags*, so it seemed appropriate to laud his success in our 'Looking Back' issue.

One look at the work of Troy Brooks and you're instantly pulled into a fully realized world of tragic beauty and smart detail. The scenarios he creates juxtapose brutality and refinement, and always with a twist to remind the audience that there's more to be found.

Inspired by film noir of the early MGM/Warner Brothers era, he captures in one frame what appears to be the aftermath of a harrowing scene, complete with plot, character development, and soft lighting any Hollywood starlet would kill for.

His works are unconventionally autobiographical, painting self-assured women trapped in a world not made for them, all dealing with this reality in a different way-malice, self-destruction, numbness, and violence.

Hot Artist

"I've been drawing pictures of women since I was two years old. Now, after years of reflecting, I understand my reasons. This was my form of transgenderism before that notion was even in my consciousness. This is how it has played itself out. Painting women in situations of power while also experiencing a kind of implosion was how I coped," said Brooks. "Without realizing it, I guess I was working through a lot of old resentment and anger with all the boys in school who had beaten the shit out of me."

Before fully embracing his artistic instincts, he would mimic the pieces he saw in the galleries, and reluctantly sought out editorial illustration work thinking it was "the only feasible way to get paid making art".

"It wasn't until I was well into my 30s that it started to feel like a shirt that didn't fit anymore. The problem was that I didn't see any art that even remotely resembled my women. I felt like a hopeless outsider to the fine art industry. Then one day I was at a friend's loft on King Street West (in Toronto) and he had enormous prints of artists like Lori Earley and Ray Caesar, and instantly I realized I was already part of a movement. It just hadn't reached Canada," Brooks expressed. "I dove headfirst into my women, and it was like a thousand iron filings all collecting themselves perfectly onto the head of a magnet. Everything shifted into place, and I started getting an intense thrust of momentum almost immediately."

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Created and operated by volunteers, **Out On The Shelves** is a non-profit, community library located in Vancouver.

They are committed to anti-oppressive social justice work, and supporting 2SLGBTQ+ writers, artists, and publishers producing creative work in Canada.

In its various iterations, and at various previous locations, the library has been serving the 2SLGBTQ+ communities of Vancouver since the early 1980s, committed to making queer books accessible, and celebrating queer stories.

Located on the second floor of the student union building of the West Point Grey campus of the University of British Columbia, the space is filled with various fiction and non-fiction books, DVDs, picture books, and a selection of middle grade and young adult books, most in a selection of languages including English, French, German, Spanish, Japanese, and Chinese.

Community Cornerstone

Recognizing that 2SLGBTQ+ people exist in multiple communities and identities, this library service seeks to advance an anti-racist, feminist, decolonizing, body-positive, and anti-ableist space. To this end, the library is staffed with volunteers who can help with everything from finding an item on a specific topic, to accessing an item which might be out of reach for someone with physical challenges.

Library cards are free for anyone; all that is required is to attend the library in person, and fill out a form, providing a name (chosen or given) with contact details such as an email address or phone number. Borrowing policies allow one to check out books and DVDs for an initial three weeks period, renewed for a maximum of three times. The exceptions to this policy are for reference materials and oversize art books, which may not be checked out. Items can be returned at any time directly to the library or to their drop box on the property.

There are no overdue fees for materials returned late, however items that are over three weeks overdue are considered lost, and the library reserves the right to charge a fine to replace the items if not returned in the same condition they were borrowed. To replace a lost or damaged item, a fee of the retail price of the item will apply. Borrowers may be offered the option to replace lost or damaged items with a copy of the same title in good condition.

In 2016-2017, the *Out On The Shelves Oral History Project* took place, headed by **David Gill**, a librarian. The purpose of the Project was, and continues to be, to help patrons and new volunteers understand the history of the library, in its current form, as well as its transitions in the past.





It's not that my past is such a train wreck that I am compelled to avoid it. Rather, I have cultivated in myself over many years a committed focus on the present moment. Almost fifty years ago, I acquired a copy of *Be Here Now* (published by the Lama Foundation, 1971), an exposition on spirituality, yoga, and meditation written by **Ram Dass** (born Richard Alpert), the American yogi and spiritual teacher.

This book was a seminal influence on a teenager immersed in mysticism and the occult, seeking to understand a world that seemed to categorically reject him and every aspect of his life.

Over the intervening five decades, I have incrementally made this approach to mindfulness a central tenet of my life experience. By focusing on the present moment, minimizing the amount of time and energy I spend on remembering the past

and projecting the future, I have found a version of contemplative peace that most of us rarely engage.
