





## The Magic of Quebec & Charlevoix

**Winter** in Quebec is pure magic. Streets dusted with snow, twinkling lights, and cozy cafés invite visitors to slow down and breathe. For LGBTQ+ travelers, this is more than scenery — it's a chance to explore vibrant culture, meet welcoming communities, and enjoy winter activities that feel tailor-made for short escapes. From Mont-Tremblant's snowy peaks to the historic charm of Old Quebec and the serene landscapes of Charlevoix, this season offers warmth, inclusivity, and adventure in equal measure.

#### **Mont-Tremblant**

Nestled in the Laurentians, Mont-Tremblant is a winter playground for all. Skiing and snowboarding dominate the day, but snowshoeing, sledding, and guided nature walks add variety for those looking to explore at a gentler pace.

Après-ski is where the charm truly shines. Local cafés and bars, such as Le P'tit Caribou, are known for welcoming queer travelers with open arms, offering live music, drinks by the fireplace, and friendly faces. Book a spa treatment at Scandinave Spa Mont-Tremblant for a winter meltaway, or linger over a hot chocolate at a boutique café while watching snow fall softly on the village below.

For LGBTQ+ travelers, several resorts and chalets openly embrace diversity. Check out Le 900 Tremblant Couette Café Bistro, a charming retreat featuring 11 rooms, and on-site café and bistro, a gathering place for lovers of good food and artisanal coffee. For an economical stay try Auberge Mountainview Inn, featuring 36 room, with some rooms including fireplace, or Tour Des Voyageurs with 49 room, 115 suites, and 675 units available for short term rental.

Winter festivals here add a lively touch: from small artisan markets to evening torch-lit walks, Mont-Tremblant feels festive without ever being crowded. It's a perfect mix of energy and tranquility, ideal for a two- or three-day getaway.


#### Old Quebec

Stepping into Old Quebec is like walking into a snow globe. Cobblestone streets, historic architecture, and seasonal lights make wandering around the city enchanting. Boutiques, galleries, and cafés line the streets, offering everything from artisanal chocolates to local crafts.

Cultural highlights include the Place d'Youville skating rink, live performances at local theaters, and pop-up winter markets along Rue Saint-Jean. LGBTQ+ travelers will find welcoming venues throughout the Saint-Roch district, including Drague Cabaret Club, known for drag shows and themed nights, and Le Pub du Parvis, a cozy bar where everyone is accepted and celebrated.

Accommodations in Old Quebec range from boutique inns to full-service hotels. Many proudly embrace diversity, ensuring that queer travelers feel safe and comfortable. Insider tip: book a table at a local bistro recommended by a hotel concierge — these small, personal touches create memorable experiences.





Take your time exploring the neighborhoods — from the Petit Champlain district with its charming shops to the historic ramparts overlooking the St. Lawrence River, every corner offers a photo-worthy moment. Evening strolls are particularly magical, with snow reflecting the warm glow of streetlamps and the quiet hum of the city around you.

#### Charlevoix

Charlevoix offers a peaceful, scenic retreat for those looking to slow down and connect with nature. Drive along the Saint Lawrence River, stopping in small towns with artisanal shops, galleries, and cozy cafés. Winter activities range from snowshoeing through forested trails to guided ice fishing excursions, or even horse-drawn sleigh rides through snow-covered valleys.







Boutique inns and B&Bs in the region openly welcome LGBTQ+ guests. Many are small, family-run operations, providing personalized service and an intimate feel. Insider tip: ask your host for local recommendations — whether it's a hidden hiking spot or a restaurant serving regional delicacies, these suggestions often make a trip unforgettable.

For those seeking art and culture, Charlevoix hosts winter exhibitions in galleries and community centers. Dining highlights include local bistros serving hearty, seasonal fare, perfect for warming up after a day outdoors. Quiet evenings by the fireplace, paired with local wine or craft beer, make Charlevoix a restorative destination.

Quebec in winter is a celebration of culture, charm, and inclusivity. From the snowy peaks of Mont-Tremblant to the historic streets of Old Quebec and the peaceful landscapes of Charlevoix, there's a richness to explore at every turn. Cozy cafés, boutique inns, winter festivals, and welcoming communities make it a destination where LGBTQ+ travelers can feel at home while discovering new adventures.

For a West Coast alternative, let's head over to Whistler, BC, where snowy slopes and Pride celebrations await.

This isn't just a party—it's an eight-day LGBTQ+ winter fest blending ski adventures, wellness, drag shows, and community connections. Officially the largest queer ski event in Canada, Whistler Pride attracts thousands of diverse travellers each year.

With guided ski groups, arts events, late-night dances, and a flair for festive inclusivity, the vibe is welcoming and high-energy every day.

#### **Pride Moments to Plan Around**

Ski-Out & Village Parade - Flag-waving festival-goers carve down Whistler Mountain and march through the Village—rainbow gear encouraged, drama guaranteed.

Free Ski & Ride Groups - Daily volunteer-led groups from beginner to expert runs, perfect for solo travellers looking to connect and explore.

Après & Themed Nights - From mid-week mixers to the sensational Snowball closing party, there's drag bingo, T-Dances, comedy, and more—a full event lineup keeps the energy high.

Youth & Family Programming - All-ages skiing, tubing, and safe spaces for queer youth—a festival truly built for every generation.

Whistler Pride Eats & Culinary Events - Celebrate queer food experiences and mountain-side bites—keep an eye out for pop-ups and community dining events.

Whistler isn't just Pride—it's an adventure playground for snow lovers:

**Epic Skiing & Board Life** 

Whistler Blackcomb delivers over 8,100 acres of terrain, with trails for every level, killer powder bowls, and world-class lift access via the Peak 2 Peak Gondola.

Heli-Skiing, Cat Skiing & Snowmobile Tours

For untouched lines, heli or cat skiing offers premium powder runs. Prefer land-based adrenaline? Snowmobile tours through backcountry trails are a scenic thrill.

#### Sliding the Olympic Track

Get your heart racing on the Whistler Sliding

Centre sled tracks (bobsleigh or skeleton) used in the 2010 Winter Olympics—yes, speeds can hit 130 km/h.

**Nordic Vibes: Cross-Country & Snowshoeing** 

Whistler Olympic Park offers 85km of groomed Nordic trails—classic, skate, or guided nighttime snowshoe treks under the stars.

#### Peak 2 Peak Gondola & Spa Time

Float between Whistler and Blackcomb peaks in the record-breaking Peak 2 Peak gondola. Wind down afterward at Scandinave Spa or take part in Pride-exclusive spa events like music and wine pools (subject to 2026 confirmation).

#### **Culture & Local Flavour**

Learn Indigenous history and cuisine at the Squamish Lil'wat Cultural Centre, then catch the Fire & Ice show—an evening spectacle of freestyle skiing, storytelling, and Indigenous art Integration.

#### **Ziplining & Helicopter Tours**

Ziptrek EcoTours' Bear Tour zips through forests and valleys. Or grab a scenic helicopter ride that includes glacier landings for jaw-dropping views and bragging rights.

#### Why Queer Travellers Love It Here


Whistler has earned its reputation for more than powder—it's built on Canadian hospitality, with local staff who get it, villages adorned in rainbow, and events built to celebrate us. Plus, it resects shared unceded

territories of the Squamish and Lil'wat Nations, with cultural programming woven thoughtfully into the tourist experience.

"Whistler made history while hosting the 2010 Olympic and Paralympic Winter Games by

providing the first ever Pride House Pavillion, which served as a safe, comfortable space for queer athletes and support staff during the games," adds Everest. "This same inclusive and welcoming spirit lives on today with Whistler accommodation providers, activity operators, and food and beverage establishments supporting equality and queer and gender rights."







#### Quick Tips: Plan Like a Pro

- . Save the dates: Jan 25–Feb 1, 2026 Festival week books out fast.
- . Book the Aava Whistler Hotel Official host hotel often offering shuttle, passes, and proximity to events. Alternatively, for a fabulous stay try Pan Pacific Whistler Village Centre or Pan Pacific Whistler Mountainside.
- . Mix outfits: base layers + flair Pyramid of snow meets sparkle = heaven.
- . Plan rest days Sleep off the Snowball party or soak it out in the village spa.
- . Rent transit passes: Whistler's dotted with buses—even ski racks—run until 3 a.m.
- . Cultural respect matters When visiting Indigenous sites, honor protocols and treat the land with care. Trust us—it matters here.

Quebec may have the cobblestones and French flair, but Whistler stands tall with rugged peaks, glowing nightlife, and queer community spirit on full display. It's where your inner snow queen finds her crown—on the mountain, at the bar, or riding down the Pride parade slope holding a friendship bracelet.

Make your plans early, pack your sass, and get ready to live the queerest winter escape yet.





# We've curated cozy winter weekend gateways from 4 major Canadian cities.

You know that feeling when the city gets a little too loud, your inbox won't quit, and your feet are freezing—but not in the fun, snowy-walk-to-acabin kind of way? That's when a long weekend escape can feel like a lifeline. Just a couple days somewhere different — somewhere that smells like fireplaces, serves good wine by the glass, welcomes you with open arms, and a bed you don't have to make — can change your whole outlook. Whether it's a solo recharge, a cozy couple's trip, or a friends' party weekend, these LGBTQ-friendly spots across Canada are just far enough to feel like a getaway, but close enough to do on a whim.

#### From Montreal:

#### Ottawa

This quiet capital turns up the sparkle come winter — especially for queer visitors. It's like taking a breath of fresh air, but with culture, cobblestones, and political charm. Skate the Rideau Canal (fingers crossed for good ice), explore local galleries and the National Arts Centre, then warm up with craft cocktails in the ByWard Market.

For three weekends in February, Winterlude, now in its 47<sup>th</sup> year, turns Canada's capital region into a frosty playground celebrating all things Canadian and Indigenous culture. It's an event attended by more than a half-million people every year.

For your getaway, consider the Cartier Place Suite Hotel. Perfectly located downtown between the scenic Rideau Canal and vibrant Elgin Street, it's ideal for a weekend escape. The property is proudly LGBTQ-friendly, offering comfort and convenience with a welcoming spirit. Or look at a stay at the stylish Le Germain or the LGBTQ-welcoming Alt Hotel downtown.



#### **Eastern Townships**

Less than two hours from Montreal, this collection of small towns serves up postcard-perfect winter. Picture sleigh rides in Magog, wine tastings in Dunham, and cozy B&Bs that feel like they were built for cuddling. Spa Eastman or Balnea are dreamy stops for a warm soak while the snow falls outside. Special mention goes to the gourmet farm-to-table restaurant Les Mal-Aimés, located in the town of Cockshire-Eaton (Town of four bell towers), where you'll enjoy a culinary experience full of rhythm and creativity—blending forgotten, local, and boreal flavours right on your plate. No wonder it's been recommended by the 2025 Michelin Guide! Bonus: The area has a growing number of queer-owned and allied businesses, making it feel both quaint and comfortable.

#### From Toronto:

#### Niagara-on-the-Lake

The kind of place where you hold hands without a second thought. The town is all charm: heritage inns, LGBTQ+ inclusive wineries, and frosty vineyard tours during Icewine season. Book a fireplace suite, catch a show at the Shaw Festival if the timing's right, and let yourself slow down. This is romance in lowercase, relaxed and real.

Want to travel is style while visiting the region? We would recommend checking out Coventry Transportation, they have been around for 87 years, and their fleet rangers from 4 passengers all the way to full bus. They are very LGBTQ+ friendly.



#### **Blue Mountain**

This one's for the spa-lovers, snowshoers, and après -ski fans. The village has boutique shops, good eats, and slopes for all levels — but you don't need to ski to enjoy it. Hit Scandinave Spa for an outdoor thermal soak (pro tip: book ahead), or take a snowy forest walk under the stars. Many of the lodges and hotels are queer-welcoming, and there's a low-key, inclusive vibe that's hard to resist.

"At the Town of Collingwood, we believe that a truly vibrant town is one where residents, visitors, and businesses feel seen, valued, and safe. By celebrating our diversity and embracing inclusivity, we don't just build a welcoming place, we cultivate a culture of respect, creativity, and shared pride that strengthens who we are as a community." says Mayor Yvonne Hamlin, Town of Collingwood.

#### Kingston

Halfway between Toronto and Montreal, Kingston's historic streets shine in winter. You'll find cozy cafés, waterfront trails, and one of the best food scenes in Ontario. As the winter evenings grow darker, downtown Kingston lights up in response. Enjoy the ambiance as you window-shop. Take a ride in a horse-drawn carriage. Bring your skates and take a spin around the public rink at Springer Market Square. Outside of downtown, there are plenty of other opportunities for you to get active in Kingston this winter! Go cross-country skiing, snowshoeing, ice fishing, or tobogganing. Holiday markets + Art after Dark shines light on the robust makers community within Kingston and surrounding regions.

Add in a drag brunch or an art crawl, and you've got a weekend that balances chill with culture. Queen's University keeps the energy young, and the city's small LGBTQ+ community is warm, proud, and visible.

Our top pick for a stay in Kingston is the Frontenac Club. They pride themselves on being warm, welcoming, and inclusive to all guests. From the moment you step inside, you become part of a community that celebrates diversity and respects individuality. On top of that, it's also one of the most stunning accommodations you'll want to experience.







#### From Calgary or Edmonton:

#### **Banff**

Classic for a reason. With glowing winter lights, hot springs, and majestic peaks that seem to hum in the cold, Banff feels like a queer-friendly snow globe. The mountain town embraces all kinds of love, especially during the quieter shoulder season. Try snow tubing at Mt. Norquay or just sip something warm at a fireside lounge. Many hotels here have diversity and inclusion policies in place, so you can show up fully as you are. You may want to check out SnowDays Festival which runs January 16 to February 8, 2026.

#### Lake Louise

Only 45 minutes from Banff, but with a slower, dreamier pace. That iconic frozen lake is open for skating, and the Fairmont Chateau turns up the grandeur. If you're lucky, catch the Ice Magic Festival (February 5 to 8, part of SnowDays Festival). Whether you go luxe or low-key, it's a weekend of fresh air, dramatic views, and serious "how is this real life?" energy.





#### From Halifax:

#### Lunenburg

UNESCO-listed and brimming with charm, Lunenburg is a winter wonderland with maritime flair. Think colourful houses dusted in snow, locally owned cafés, and seafood chowder that hits the spot after a day of exploring. It's small, walkable, and quietly queer-welcoming. If you time it right, you might even catch local theatre or live music.

#### **Wolfville & Annapolis Royal**

Wolfville is known for its vineyards (many queer-friendly), artsy vibes, and slow rhythm — perfect for a little hibernation with style. Nearby Annapolis Royal adds historic charm and gentle coastal walks. Together, they're a reminder that queer-friendly doesn't always mean big city — sometimes, it means just being seen and welcomed in a small, beautiful place

Not every getaway has to be epic. Sometimes it's about packing light, chasing a new view, and choosing places where you can be your whole self — scarf, snow boots, and all. Whether it's a last-minute booking or a long-planned pause, these long weekend escapes might be exactly what you need before the season's over.

For many Canadians, the United States has long been the go-to for quick escapes into warmer climates, vibrant cultures, and queer-friendly communities. Over the last year, though, the political climate has given some pause — and that's understandable. But as with any country, the full story is bigger than its headlines. Across the U.S., there are cities and towns where LGBTQ+ culture thrives openly, where art and nightlife pulse with inclusivity, and where visitors are embraced with genuine hospitality. Palm Springs, Austin, and Sedona are three such destinations — each offering a different flavour of sunshine, community, and connection.

#### Palm Springs, California

Palm Springs isn't just sunny — it's unapologetically itself. A historic LGBTQ+ haven since the mid-20th century, this desert oasis is still one of the most welcoming spots in the country. Here, queer culture isn't tucked away — it's front and centre. Downtown buzzes with rainbow flags, stylish boutiques, and a thriving food scene.

For nightlife, you can't miss Hunters — a staple on Arenas Road where the dance floor never stops — or Chill Bar, perfect for drag shows and themed nights. Daytime? Laze by the pool at Descanso Resort (men-only, but brimming with character) or book a suite at the colourful Saguaro Palm Springs. If your timing's right, Palm Springs Pride (November 6 through 9<sup>th</sup>, 2025) transforms the streets into a desert rainbow — a festival that feels like a love letter to the queer community itself. Palm Springs Equality Week is celebrated October 25<sup>th</sup> this year. And don't skip the Palm Springs Aerial Tramway, which whisks you from desert heat to cool mountain trails in just ten minutes.



#### Extra insider tips:

- Grab brunch at Eight4Nine, a locally adored spot known for its pink décor and all-welcome attitude.
- Check out PS Underground, an immersive dining/theatre experience that's as queer-friendly as it is unpredictable.
- Many boutique hotels here are clothing-optional worth noting for travellers who like their sunshine with a side of freedom.


#### **Austin, Texas**

"Keep Austin Weird" isn't just a slogan — it's a lifestyle. This city blends Southern charm with progressive values, making it one of the most LGBTQ-friendly cities in the state. You'll find drag brunches at Rain on 4<sup>th,</sup> delicious vegan baked good at queer owned Skull & Cakebones, and live music venues that will keep you out until sunrise.

For lodging, Hotel San José offers retro-modern vibes and a courtyard perfect for morning mimosas. Austin's annual QueerBomb parade and Austin Pride (usually August, so you may want to plan for next year) are bold, grassroots celebrations that turn the city into a playground of colour and sound. But the magic of Austin is also in its everyday — an evening on South Congress browsing quirky shops, catching live music at Mohawk Austin, or sharing tacos at Veracruz All Natural. It's the kind of place where "y'all" comes with a smile, no matter who you are or who you love.

#### Extra insider tips:

- Oilcan Harry's is Austin's oldest gay bar and still a lively dance spot.
- For daytime community connection, check out The Little Gay Shop, a queer marketplace and community organizer that amplifies the voices and artistry of queer creatives.
- Foodies shouldn't miss Lick Honest Ice Creams proudly queer-friendly and serving inventive, locally sourced flavour.



#### Sedona, Arizona

If Palm Springs is bold and Austin is buzzing, Sedona is serene. Known for its red rock landscapes and spiritual energy, this is a getaway for the soul. Hike Cathedral Rock at sunrise, or book a guided jeep tour through the canyons for views that make you forget Wi-Fi exists.

Sedona's LGBTQ+ community might be quieter than in a big city, but it's woven into the fabric of its wellness culture. Couples' spa treatments, queer-friendly yoga retreats, and boutique stays like Sky Ranch Lodge make it a romantic escape. The Sedona International Film Festival (February 21<sup>st</sup> through March 1<sup>st</sup>, 2026) often features LGBTQ+ stories, adding a cultural dimension to your trip.

And when the sun sets? Grab a blanket and head outside — Sedona is a certified Dark Sky Community, so the stars put on a nightly show worthy of poetry.

#### Extra insider tips:

- Local guides offer LGBTQ+-specific vortex tours for those curious about Sedona's famous spiritual energy points.
- Book dinner at Mariposa Latin Inspired Grill for upscale dining with breathtaking red rock views.

Travelling to the U.S. as a Canadian right now can feel complicated — but travel, at its heart, is about connection. It's about stepping into spaces where joy, acceptance, and shared humanity can still thrive despite political divides. Palm Springs, Austin, and Sedona each remind us that there are pockets of warmth — both literal and metaphorical — waiting to welcome us. So pack your


sunscreen, bring an open heart, and let the sunshine in.



#### **The Allure of Destination Weddings**

**Destination** weddings have long captured the imagination of couples looking for something extraordinary: a ceremony in a place that reflects their personalities, values, and love story. For LGBTQ+ couples, the allure can be even stronger.

Research shows that destination weddings are growing in popularity among queer couples. So, curious as we usually are we dug deeper, and it turns out that LGBTQ+ couples, and it comes as no surprise, are increasingly choosing destination weddings not just for the scenery, but for the freedom to design a celebration that truly reflects their identities — a chance to celebrate openly in a supportive, welcoming environment.

And what they seem to be seeking are destinations that combine natural beauty, cultural richness, and fabulous hospitality. Whether it's a beachfront vow exchange or a mountain-top ceremony, the right location can transform a wedding into a memory that lasts a lifetime.

We asked two experienced wedding professionals to share their insight into planning LGBTQ+ destination weddings, offering a closer look at two very different locations: Costa Rica and Halifax.







#### Costa Rica: Where Queer Love Feels Visible

Let's start with Costa Rica, and who better to speak to than El-Farouk Khaki, a marriage officiant who has helped couples from around the world celebrate their unions here. Khaki first arrived in Costa Rica in 1993 and was immediately captivated by its vibrant queer scene. "I saw arguably the best drag show I've ever attended — a 45-minute Madonna tribute that left the whole room cheering," he recalls. From San Jose to the Pacific coast, Costa Rica has a long history of welcoming LGBTQ+ travelers, with towns like Manuel Antonio offering clothing-optional beaches and a lively tourist culture.

We asked Khaki about the appeal of Costa Rica for destination weddings. He explained that the combination of stunning natural backdrops, inclusive communities, and flexibility for couples from countries where same-sex marriage isn't legally recognized makes Costa Rica a special place to celebrate. Whether it's a beach ceremony at sunset or a private forest gathering, couples can design a wedding that reflects their love story.

For couples considering a Pacific coast celebration, the Guanacaste province, and specifically Playas del Coco, offers a perfect mix of accessibility and charm. Just 25 km from Liberia International Airport, the crescent-shaped beach with volcanic sand, boutique hotels, and world-class restaurants sets the scene for unforgettable weddings. Couples can also work with local officiants, add musical performances, and customize ceremonies to reflect their culture, spirituality, or aesthetic.

Khaki emphasizes that these weddings are not only about logistics but about creating meaningful experiences. "Couples come to me because they want to celebrate their love in a place that allows them freedom and joy," he says.

The personal touches — whether it's a sunrise vow exchange, an intimate dinner, or a family-friendly celebration — make Costa Rica a destination where queer love feels visible, honored, and unforgettable.

He also collaborates with his husband, Troy Jackson, and percussionist Tajalli Moondragon for music, ceremony hosting, and special touches to make each wedding unique.

#### Halifax: A Hidden Weddings Gem

We also spoke with Ashley Groves, the owner of Happily Hitched Halifax, to get her perspective on why Halifax is quietly becoming a favourite for LGBTQ+ couples planning destination weddings.

Ashley has been welcoming couples from across Canada and beyond to her downtown chapel, specializing in elopements and micro-weddings. She says what draws people to Halifax isn't just its natural beauty — though the ocean views, cobblestone streets, and nearby vineyards are undeniably romantic — it's the feeling of safety and inclusion. "We see couples who could go to Mexico or Vegas," she told us, "but instead they choose Halifax because it's beautiful, safe, and affirming. It's a way to have the magic of travel without the stress of passports, political uncertainty, and to experience Maritime hospitality at its best."

In the first four months of 2025, over 81,000
Ontarians visited Nova Scotia, and Halifax Stanfield
International Airport welcomed 129,000 air visitors,
with Ontario as the largest source market. With
multiple daily direct flights from Toronto, Ottawa,
and Montreal in under two hours, the city is
surprisingly accessible for a weekend escape or a
longer celebration. Halifax is also one of Canada's
most gender-diverse cities, which matters to
2SLGBTQIA+ travellers — 89% cite safety as a top
priority when choosing destinations.











Ashley's chapel offers fully inclusive ceremonies with everything from officiants and photography to bubbly toasts and locally sourced sweet treats. She also works with drag performers, I ivestreaming services, and other creative touches so every couple can shape their wedding to reflect who they are. "We celebrate love in all its forms," Ashley says. "Every couple who walks through our doors is welcomed, seen, and joyfully celebrated."

Couples often turn their Halifax wedding into a full getaway: stroll the waterfront, explore Peggy's Cove, taste Nova Scotian wine, or enjoy fresh local seafood. For 2SLGBTQIA+ couples especially, Ashley says Halifax offers the kind of safe, affirming experience that isn't always guaranteed abroad.
