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
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
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From the **Publisher**


for other innovative techies. Our hats off to them!


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Despite the fact that the tech industry is one of the most progressive and forwardthinking industries in the world, the technology industry has long been dominated by straight, white, cisgender men.

In recent years, the industry has seen a growing presence of queer people, who are making their mark in the tech world with the help of organizations such as <u>Gradient Spaces</u>, <u>QueerTech</u> and companies like Dev Delivery.

Queer people have been involved in the tech industry for decades, but their presence historically speaking has been largely invisible. This is beginning to change, however, as more queer people are coming out and making their voices heard as well as their abilities and contributions seen. Queer people are making their presence felt in a variety of ways; they are founding tech companies, developing new technologies, and working in leadership roles. They are also advocating for greater diversity and inclusion in the tech industry and pushing for more equitable policies and practices.

The 2SLGBTQIA+ community has long been underrepresented in the technology industry but there's a shift taking place towards greater representation. Companies are really starting to recognize the importance of creating an inclusive environment for all employees regardless of their sexual orientation, gender identity or gender expression. Queer people are finally at the point where they're feeling more able to thrive in their own successes and confident enough to speak up for advocation purposes – and that's thanks in part to helpful, and resourceful organizations that live behind the big tech companies, working towards the greater good.

One of the most visible examples of this shift is the increasing number of queer-focused tech conferences and events through queer-focused organizations aimed to give the community a "leg up." These events provide a platform for 2SLGBTQIA+ tech professionals to network, share ideas, and learn from each other. They also provide a safe space for people to discuss their experiences in the industry and to advocate for greater representation. There are a growing number of these queer-focused tech organizations working tirelessly and steadily at making the industry not only more inclusive, but more accessible too through providing resources and mentorship.



QueerTech is one of the organizations tackling the tech ecosystem while breaking down barriers, creating spaces, and connecting communities to bring empowerment and support to the 2SLGBTQIA+ community across Canada and beyond. It started off as a tech professionals meet up group in Montreal, 2016 - fast forward two years later in 2018, QueerTech was born. "Queer representation is important on so many levels - by having more queer people, we can promote diversity in the workplace, and it's been shown that it leads to better business outcomes, and more innovation," shared co-founder and CEO of QueerTech, Naoufel Testaouni. "Representation combats stereotypes which can lead to breaking down barriers and will help us address the systemic inequities that exist and have historically impacted marginalized queer communities. The second piece is creating role models in the industry - we need them to inspire young queer people to pursue careers in STEM and in tech, and also provide mentorship, support and guidance."

Their main priority and/or goal is to create opportunities for queer people to enter the tech space through skill development, their QT Conferences, QT Connect Café, Qareers talent networking, QT Access, QT Care (for mental, physical, and financial health) and more, as to advance themselves personally and professionally. Their founding pillar is pride, and through their pride they work to educate companies on creating and fostering more inclusive, diverse workspaces. "One of the key things we've focused on is building a community first. We've done over 200 events around connecting the community," Testaouni expressed.

"Right now, we have a program called Qareers, it's a workforce development program helping the community advance in tech. Another initiative we're working on is called QT Access, it's a 9-week program where we work to build confidence and give them the tools and skills they need to apply to tech jobs. At the same time, we have our QT Conference which helps to bring the community together to create a sense of belonging, provide opportunities to upskill and rescale, and build professional development plans. We also work with tech companies to build their brand higher with the community and through collaboration as to raise awareness around particular challenges and barriers we face in Canada."



Gradient Spaces is another fairly new Canadian organization laser-focused on building a strong foundation for 2SLGBTQIA+ innovators to launch from through instilling resilience, fostering connection, enabling innovation, providing opportunity, enforcing solidarity, bridging community, and relaying accessible tech industry learnings. "It's really about a future being built by all of us," Director of *Gradient Spaces*, **Alex Baccellieri** said proudly. "Our non-for-profit organization is committed to collective action and building affirmative generative, and spaces filled with joy and hope for 2SLGBTQIA+ people to grow and innovate together as a community."

Formed by former *Venture Out* team members, *Gradient Spaces* was created in 2020 and its mission to support 2SLGBTQIA+ members of Canada's startup ecosystem was made evident from the very beginning. "We provide resources and opportunities to assist people on a personal level and in a professional sense but also, we empower people to continue challenging the societal barriers that still exist today through carving intersectional spaces in tech." Part of the support offered is through their job board which helps people find their next career in tech with companies who are committed to intersectionality inclusion.

Gradient Spaces launched their *Founder Program* in 2021, which incorporates educational sessions led by experts, and also provides mentorship opportunities with startup industry veterans, and the chance to pitch in front of an investor panel. "Our 3 month founder program supports up and coming entrepreneurs to develop, implement and execute compelling strategies," said Baccellieri. "It also gives people the opportunity to network with investors from a visibility standpoint and to propel them down their path to success. Our decision to turn our support into a program was so that we could provide founders the ability to access the much-needed resources required to create their own business."

Founder of *Dev Delivery*, a tech company based in Europe, **Joe Andrzejewski** is a member of the queer community who has been working in software development for over 20 years. "I started in networking. When I as a kid, my mom would bring home old office equipment. I'd reassemble it and play around – this was pre-internet days." Today, Andrzejewski builds development teams offshore and sells services to businesses in the USA, Canada, and Europe. "I'm happy building out my development company from the comfort of an island in the middle



of the Atlantic." Due to the support from his family, friends, and network, he grew to love and flourish in the tech industry – this is why support for people who don't always have close people in their circle to help them succeed is crucial, and that's where organizations like *QueerTech* and *Gradient Spaces* come in, to help foster and encourage more people who will become "Joes" in the tech industry, and these "Joes" will create businesses which will employ more 2SLGBTQIA+ folk, and influence the scope of technology at large. "The tech industry isn't only for techies. We hire project managers, writers, marketers, etc. Come! We need more people, and the opportunities are good."

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Yesterday and Today's Queer Pioneers in Tech

Technology specialists are primarily concerned with the research, development, and practical use of electronics, software, computers, and artificial intelligence.

The tech sector connects users by building digital communities and managing social media platforms such as *Meta* (formerly *Facebook*), *YouTube*, and *WhatsApp*. This industry is one of the most soughtafter areas for financial investment as specialists will often create new products, services and whole economies that have never existed before.

In the early stages of the Internet, computer users learned they could manufacture anonymous identities and act out these new roles in a safe way. The LGBTQ2S+ community was quick to advance their digital presence and made several impressive contributions to virtual spaces where they could connect with other like-minded individuals, and access goods and services without fear of abuse.

One of the earliest trans tech specialists and pioneers was **Lynn Conway**, an intelligent individual who worked at *IBM* designing supercomputers in the 1960s. Then by the 1970s, she was designing computer chips at *Xerox*. "When I made the decision to have a gender correction, everybody told me I was terrible, I was going to end up dead or in an asylum someplace," she writes. "But they were wrong. I've had a great life, I'm very happy, and I've managed to do some productive, important work."

Martine Rothblatt co-created *Sirius XM Satellite Radio* in 1990, then founded the biotech company *United Therapeutics* in 1996. Rothblatt has been married to **Bina Aspen** for over 4 decades, and they went through Rothblatt's gender transition as a loving unit. "I took a journey from male to female, so if I hide that, I'm, like, just replicating the closet of my past with another closet of the future," Rothblatt said. "That made no sense, and that's why I'm open."

David Bohnett co-founded *GeoCities* in 1994, which was one of the very first social networking websites. After he sold GeoCities to *Yahoo* in 1999, he then created the *David Bohnett Foundation*, that supports social justice issues and promotes activism. Through the foundation Bohnett donated over \$20 million to LGBTQ2S+ organizations, and established "*CyberCenters*" designed to give the marginalized communities easier access to the Internet.

Tim Cook worked for major players in the tech world such as IBM, Compaq, and Intelligent *Electronics* before joining *Apple* in 1998. By 2005, Cook would form critical deals with manufacturers on flash memory, the computer storage component that would form the basis for the iPhone and iPad. "[Being gay] has been tough and uncomfortable at times, but it has given me the confidence to be myself, to follow my own path, and to rise above adversity and bigotry," Cook wrote in his comingout essay. "It's also given me the skin of a rhinoceros, which comes in handy when you're the CEO of Apple." One of the biggest contributions Cook has made to the tech industry was to create the infrastructure to own the entire production process including manufacturing the highly sought silicon. Under his guidance the innovative Apple Watch was developed and released in 2015, and the best-selling wireless AirPods were released in 2016. Recently Cook has shifted gears at Apple to focus on nonhardware items such as subscription services like Apple Music, Apple News+, and Apple TV+.

Arlan Hamilton is managing partner at <u>Backstage</u> <u>Capital</u>, a company she forged while experiencing homelessness in 2015. The firm solely invests in companies led by marginalized entrepreneurs; females, people of color, and LGBTQ2S+ individuals. She is known as the only queer Black woman to have built a venture capital starting at a deficit.

Ana Arriola-Kanada has worked in executive positions at *Meta*, *Samsung*, and *Sony*. As of February 2022, they became the general manager of design and research for *Microsoft* specializing in artificial intelligence. Arriola-Kanada's work has recently included the research and design of the *Industrial* *Metaverse*, and they've been working in humancentric and ethical design of products. Arriola-Kanada is a proud "Latine mother of the trans and non-binary experience," and like they said at a recent press conference, "don't be told how or what you should be doing in your life, you define it yourself."

Ann Mei Chang became the CEO of Candid in 2021 and served as chief innovation officer for Pete for America (Pete Buttigieg's groundbreaking Presidential campaign). Chang was previously chief innovation officer at the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID), and she became the first executive director of the US Global Development Lab, an innovation hub that calls on Silicon Valley for global solutions. She also worked as a senior advisor for women and technology in the State Department, and as a product development engineer at Apple, Intuit, and Google. Chang says being a lesbian in the tech industry can be seen as beneficial because "you diffuse the sexual tension thing; you are working with young nerdy guys who aren't sure how to deal with women. It made it a lot easier."

LGBTQ2S+ folks often face barriers in achieving employment in the tech industry, which has led to massive underrepresentation in this ever-growing field. As the tech sector grows and evolves through research, experimentation, and innovation, it's imperative for individuals on the gender and sexual spectrum to reach new heights within the tech world to ensure the production and consumption of goods and services are generated and disseminated as equitably as possible, and that the virtual world can remain a lucrative and safe space for everyone.

<u>TiLT</u>, a **Tracy Lee Stum** Museum PV is a recently opened new experience in Old Town, offering an opportunity for visitors to enter into a mesmerizing, interactive world of 3D anamorphic art murals. The artwork is created to be explored and experienced, where one can step through surreal scenarios and revive their sense of wonder within a magical world. There's also an intimate lobby lounge that offers creative cocktails that are presented as artwork libations. Plan Your Visit








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If you're familiar with the indie music scenes of Toronto or St. John's, you may already know <u>Kelly McMichael.</u>

Her numerous music projects include *Rouge*, *RENDERS, Kelly McMichael & The Gloss*, and her work with **Regina Gently/Gentleman Reg**, but with the 2021 release of her debut solo album *Waves*, she's been given a major boost of well-deserved recognition.

Her steady rise to success has ripened to a 2022 ECMA 'Best Rock Recording' win, a MusicNL 'Songwriter of the Year' award, and a Polaris Prize shortlisting (of which she is particularly proud of), all for an album she "honestly didn't think many people would hear beyond friends and family."

After relocating to Newfoundland in 2014, she settled into the St. John's music community and recorded some self-produced material, later signing with LHM Records and teaming up with producer/ drummer **Jake Nicoll** to co-produce *Waves*. The album's lush production is particularly compelling, supporting McMichael's dynamic voice while exuding a refined character of its own. McMichael adds, "Jake is a special person to work with. I also had a heavy hand in it – I knew what I wanted production-wise, and I really like doing that stuff."

Self-described as 'thoughtful retro-inspired pop rock', the songs on *Waves* are catchy, and sophisticated.

Hot Artist

Weaving through experiences with old friends, colleagues, and lovers, McMichael's honest lyrics expose a reverence for friendship, and a longing for connection. Her candidness allows us to see behind the 'powdered nose' of an industry pro, bringing a real human quality to this dreamy landscape.

The album bounces seamlessly between guitarbased tracks, and ones that are more synth driven. McMichael explains, "I purposefully use different [writing] techniques to make sure my songs have range and variation. Writing on guitar, piano, synths and beats, writing with just vocals and a loop pedal, writing sober, writing with some herbal assistance ..."

"I write as therapy, and to empower myself, but I also work hard at refining what I create to open it up and hopefully help others or share some wisdom. I hope to motivate people who have been underestimated, or [who are] quiet, to find their power and strength, and accept their differences and stand up for what's right."

Reflecting on her success in 2022, she says, "it has certainly put me in a position for major growth, and set me up for the reception of my next album, which is incredible to know there will be an audience for. It's a big win for the underdog and for my community in NL, and for my band, but I still have a long way to go to compete in this capitalistic, commercially-driven, algorithm-based, parasitic streaming platform/social media-dependant music industry."

As I scroll, I can't help daydreaming about going back to the break room, letting the cute guy pull me up onto one of those rickety little tables, his lips parting as we press against each other...

I can never tell a soul, let alone the world, about my petite secret.

I am absolutely certain that if I were to come out, the powers that be would find a way to strip me of my title. I can't let that happen. Do I sometimes wish I could have a normal life that allows me to settle down with a nice guy? Yes, I do. But not more than I want that crown. Besides, it would break my parents' hearts if their only son didn't succeed them on the throne.

Sure, my family has had their own fair share of secrets. Hell, here are more secrets than rules (and if you couldn't tell by now, we have a lot of rules). My Royal Family tree isn't with-out its rotten apples—or rotten maple leaves, to keep things on brand. But I may just be the worst. A blight, the one to



petrify the family tree so that not a single leaf remains clinging to its ancient branches.

It's bad enough that the Firm and current conservative government share a littleknown penchant for wanting to streamline the Royal Family, meaning the three of us could be stripped of our titles at any moment.

Selfishly, abdicating the throne would alleviate me of the immense weight to remain in the closet. But I couldn't do that to my parents, even if I could find a good way out, and there isn't one—out of the closet or out of the monarchy. This beautiful small city of 34,000 full-time residents also boasts other, smaller seasonal theatre troupes, a symphony, art gallery, outdoor summer cinema, a summer music festival, and some exceptional restaurants and accommodations. Stratford has also been dubbed "Canada's gayest small city."

In July 2021, **Bruce Skeaff, Ian Middleton**, and **Steve Walters** recognized the need to address many shortcomings in the services provided to Stratford's 2SLGBTQ+ community, from social opportunities to health and wellness resources and supports. They sent out a letter to 300 local businesses to ask if they could support such concerns; the response was a resounding, "Yes!" Within a few weeks, an online information hub went live. On June 4, 2022, a brickand-mortar space became reality.

The Stratford Pride Community Centre serves

people living in Stratford and Perth County, those who are planning to visit or looking for a welcoming place to call home. The SPCC works to advance its community as a progressive, inclusive, and welcoming place to live, work, visit or do business, and is a valuable resource for businesses and organizations wanting to learn how to be more 2SLGBTQ+positive in their interactions with clients, customers, and staff.

Community Cornerstone

The centre features 2 meeting rooms for booking. The front room, with large windows overlooking the street, is 500 sq. ft., with seating for 11, a library of over 200 2SLGBTQ+ publications, and an electric fireplace. The rear space of the same size is accessible through a pair of solid oak doors and features a 42" TV screen featuring three boardroom-style tables, and seating for 22. These spaces are home to movie nights, guest speakers, author readings, yoga classes, art installations, and drag story time. A gender-neutral washroom and a kitchenette are easily accessed from either meeting room.

Although the centre is on the 2nd floor of a heritage building, and generally accessible by a staircase of 25 steps, a backdoor to the space connects to the Festival Square mall which allows elevator access between the hours of 9:00a.m. and 5:00p.m., with 4 steps at the connecting landing. Once inside, the space is predominantly handicap accessible. The centre is actively seeking donations and support for a lift or other device to make their space fully accessible.

The SPCC now organizes and operates, with the assistance of local businesses and the Festival Theatre, the *Stratford Winter Pride Festival*, which took place over the weekend of February 9 to 12 which had featured a comedy night, a drag night, a cabaret-style dinner show with some of the cast of the forthcoming Festival production of "*Rent*", guest musicians/vocalists, followed by a dance after-party, and a Sunday morning faith service at a local church.

Having grown proudly and strongly in such a short time, the *Stratford Pride Community Centre* holds great promise for a stellar future as a beacon and example for creating a safe, welcoming, and enduring space to do work, live, or visit.



I'm old enough to remember the sound of a 9600 baud modem connecting my computer to a telephone line.

In the pre-Internet age, online communities were supported by bulletin board systems (BBSs) that were connected by regular phone lines. The host of the BBS would install multiple telephone lines and connect each one to a modem (modulator/ demodulator). BBS guests would dial one of several phone numbers from their own modems to connect with the host's setup.

These were not regular telephone voice calls. They were digital connections that allowed you to type conversations with other BBS guests, much like group text chats happen now on our phones. Many had simple text-only interfaces that allowed guests to post comments and responses to categories of topics of interest to the community.

For queers at the time, some of these BBSs would be the first "safe spaces" to become available, where you could be yourself, ask questions, and chat about queer personal issues. With names like *The Gay Blade*, and *GLIB Gay and Lesbian Information Bureau*, you could find their dial-up numbers listed in advertisements in the back of gay magazines and newsletters.

I have fond memories of chatting late into the night about everything under the sun (and moon), occasionally flirting, and generally experiencing something that felt like a digital home. Here was some validation that you were not alone in the world but had some connection to a larger community of like-minded individuals.

With the advent of the World Wide Web and access to the nascent Internet, BBSs slowly faded in popularity. In step with increasing social acceptance, queer online communities were able to step out of the shadows and develop into dependable online resources for queer information, entertainment and connection.
