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




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
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From the **Publisher**

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
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

They've also worked with brands such as Fenty Beauty, Canada Goose, Sephora, and Marc Jacobs.

Canada's Very Own
Fashion Disruptor and Guru

Myles Sexton

"I mean, why limit ourselves? That's why I do so many things. I am a very complex human with a lot of creativity and passion. I love being able to lean into different areas of my career which always keeps it exciting! That being said, I've really had to learn how to multitask and manage my time. The most rewarding things I currently get to do would have to be my segments on Cityline. I've really been working hard to creating segments that allow people's voices to be heard who might not get a voice as often in mainstream media."

CAFA award-winning Sexton is proudly six years sober, and currently lives in their newly (first) purchased home located about 1.5 hours away from Toronto in Georgian Bay with their partner Tyler Austin, Atlas their dog, and Kitten their cat. "Winning the CAFA was a very full circle moment

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for me. Especially in an industry that is still very conservative. I want to inspire people to live their truth and reclaim their power over shame, so this award was very validating of my hard work." Sexton took home CAFA's Digital Fashion Creator Award in 2022.

Rewind 15 or so years ago, a 19-year-old Sexton left their small town of Brooklyn, Nova Scotia, with its population of less than 2000 people, for the big city of Toronto where they had achieved incredible success in international modelling, celebrity makeup artistry, fashion magazine creation, and jewelry designing, all by the tender age of 24. A young Sexton's clients included the likes of Grace Jones, Nelly Furtado, and Maye Musk (yes, Elon's mother).

Sexton adored and gravitated towards fashion since childhood – one of their favourite designers from the earlier years was Montreal's Denis Gagnon. "His pieces are very gender neutral and really break the binaries of silhouettes used within fashion design. Many of his pieces drape fabric in unique ways, he plays with pleats a lot and love his use of color."

"What drew me to fashion at a young age was history and fantasy books/movies. Seeing people express themselves outside of the strict gendered binaries that I grew up in really inspired me. Seeing these masculine men in leather gladiator skirts or elves in Lord of the Rings in their very delicate attire and were applauded for their strength, I wanted to be like them in many ways!" shared Sexton. "Fashion then really became the armour I needed to protect myself



while I was doing a lot of internal work. I knew if I looked fabulous no one could hurt me, so I used fashion to help protect me while I was healing and growing."

In 2018, Sexton's relentless pursuance of accomplishing dreams came to a temporary halt when they had learned of their sudden HIV diagnosis which initially instilled fear and the panic of uncertainty due to lack of proper awareness. It's been five or so years of self-education, Sexton has been courageously back to slaying dreams since approximately two years ago with an added purpose, to help educate and fight the HIV/AIDS stigma as a shining light of an example and looking stylish as hell while doing so.


Sexton has been a national ambassador for the Canadian Foundation for AIDS Research (CANFAR), having taken on a more leadership role with Sexfluent, CANFAR's youth-focused HIV and sexual empowerment program which they helped to spearhead and create from its inception. "I think my life has been nothing but one big challenge, but I've used those challenges as lessons, and I think they have made me a stronger person because of it. When you go against the tide, you're always going to get push back, but you will also meet so many other beautiful people who are there trying to create change, too."

Sexton's future continues to look bright, as they continue to dream up new fashionable dreams every day; having recently launched their podcast, *Our Private Bits*, featuring empowered conversations or topics that would typically go unspoken in order to foster growth and understanding within the community. Aside from podcasting, Sexton expressed his keen interest in diving into more on-screen work, "My TV career is just starting to take off, so I am hoping to really keep learning and growing in this area of my life. Maybe my own show one day let's manifest it!"

Sexton divulged exclusive fashion tips for PinkPlayMags readers, but it's not what you're expecting or what you'd read in a run-of-the-mill fashion magazine. "Wear what makes you happy, because at the end of the day fashion can be an extension of our internal joy. Lastly don't believe in trends it's just a bunch of marketing trying to make you buy things. Fashion is about self-expression not what you're told is reliant or cool." There you have it, you've been given the green light from Canada's guru of fashion to embrace your own style, which is as permanent as you want it to be – unlike fashion trends which are fleeting, and not a true representation of you.

Fashion is experiencing a queer renaissance of late, one that goes beyond the mainstream binary attire into a more genderless style.

Out with the pink and blue stereotypes, and in with the eclectic array of rainbow hues. Designers are experimenting with clothing more based on people's different body shapes rather than gendered clothing categorization. Not only does this provide individuals with the opportunity to express themselves as to who they are, but it often can reflect a political awareness within society's norms.

No longer is clothing being created as practical for males, and purely aesthetic for females, but more tied into one's own identity and self-expression. We've seen gender roles being turned upside down in music and film for ages, from Grace Jones and Tilda Swinton to today's new crop of boundary pushers, Sam Smith and Troye Sivan. And of course, we have drag queens to thank for bringing their genderfuckery to mainstream audiences in recent years as well.

We had an opportunity to chat with two local Toronto area designers who are working effortlessly to create clothing that has no boundaries, and to specifically create items for those who are wanting to express themselves as who they really are, not defined by gender only.



Charlotte Carbone (They/Them-She/Her) has a Bachelor of Design in Fashion, and enjoys creating interdisciplinary projects that combine street dance, fashion, and abstract storytelling. They are dedicated to creating work and sharing knowledge that honours the lived experiences of marginalized people, drawing from their own experiences as a queer diasporic Asian adoptee. They recently left a position within the corporate fashion world to become a full-time freelancer as a dance and costume artist for film, television, and live performances. They also won in Season 1 of the competitive fashion reality show, *Stitched*.

Their interpretation of queer fashion means "centering values of queer community, such as protest, resistance, resilience, and complexity." Adding, "My artistic practices are grounded by my lived experiences as I explore complex themes of intersectional identity, collective and individual healing processes, and legacy building. I believe it is important to create synergy between academia and industry, thought and action, in order to be an effective change maker in all spheres."

They've had the opportunity to create some thought-provoking pieces in the past, including the bisexual couch for IKEA Canada's 2021 Pride Campaign. Their audience for fashion and costume work are fellow queer racialized artists, such as those within Toronto's ballroom scene, with their most accessible public costume works being used as part of the Toronto Kiki Ballroom Alliance (TKBA) balls.

They recall one of the most challenging designs worked on, "My most intricate recent work is a clear vinyl dress filled with fake blood in honour of World AIDS Day. It was challenging because you can't sew vinyl with conventional methods. You actually should fuse it with heat to create a full seal so that the liquid doesn't leak out. It made it down the runway but needed some 911 assistance afterwards."

"My work is grounded by being desire-based instead of damage-centred (a concept by Indigenous scholar Eve Tuck), and research-creation processes. Everything I do is an attempt to shape a more equitable and accountable world, which means letting lived experience and compassion lead the way," they explain.

In terms of what the future of fashion might hold, Carbone believes, "A total collapse of the fast fashion industry is necessary to create sustainable and equitable fashion industry practices. The current system is failing by design. I want to see more locality, a pull back from the globalization of fashion."

Carbone is currently finishing their Master of Design, doing product development for a queer-trans* start-up, and making 1-of-1 costumes for live events. When not designing, they are passionate about their communities, home, finding peace, enjoying the process, and slowing down.

Jared Colautti (He/Him) is the Founder and Head Stylist with Run The Crown, and has a line of clothing made specifically for masculine presenting individuals that's queer positive and gender neutral, made to fit a woman's or trans man's body. He believes clothing is the most intimate form of self-expression, and the most obvious. It's a personal choice one makes every day, and the first thing people notice when forming an opinion of you, before they've heard your voice or seen your eyes.

"I've always been interested in fashion from a very early age. I started selling custom made clothing for



cis men and had been doing that for years. When I got married, one of our masc-presenting non-binary guests wanted to wear a suit to our wedding but had a terrible time finding something. That's when I realized this was a problem that could be solved with custom made clothing," he divulged. "Masculine presenting women, non-binary folks, and trans men are typically ignored by traditional retailers, so their only option is to wear clothes that don't fit their bodies, or clothes that don't match how they see themselves."

Describing the design process, he explains, "We design formal and semi-formal wear that is custom made for each client using their specific measurements, so the shoulders, chest and hips will always fit perfectly. The style of the suit will be as masc or fem as the client wants because they choose their own style details. The result is a garment that fits their body properly and represents their identity."

Their clients tend to be mostly professionals who want to feel comfortable and confidant at work, or for a special occasion. "We love it when a client has a specific vision for what they want to create, and

it's our job to find the solution to make their vision a reality. When our clients try on their garments, they stand taller, look stronger and gain a sense of pride. We create our clothing to last, and we're happy to make what our clients want, but we recommend against hyper trendy fashions, because what is popular this season may not be next season. We don't sell clothing, we sell confidence," he proclaims.

Envisioning his next move, "I keep promising myself I'll create a fashion show with clients as models to showcase our work and to celebrate themselves. I just completed a fashion shoot with a few of them, and I plan on doing more of those next year." As for the future of fashion, his prediction is, "The late nineties loose fitting trend will continue next year and will be here for a while, but to us, showcasing your individual identity through your personal style is more important than following fashion trends. Fashion is fleeting, while personal style is timeless, and a lot more interesting," he believes.

Jared also had something to say about the fast fashion industry, "The retail business model is based on low cost and high volumes, meaning poor quality garments that customers buy, discard, and replace frequently. Not only is that environmentally damaging, it also sacrifices quality and craftsmanship."

All in all though, things are looking great. "I'm currently expanding Run the Crown to other cities. A consultation with us is a manual process, as our stylists meet with clients in person, so our sales area is limited to where we have stylists. I would like to find stylists in other areas so we can empower more people to discover their confidence. Contact us if you would like to become a Run the Crown stylist!"

A national treasure in its own right, Casa Loma is illuminated in colour to enchant visitors from December 1st, 2023, to January 8th, 2024. The cold might become a passing thought as you "ooh" and "aah" at the warmth of all the lights, festive decorations, and live entertainment. You may even just leave with your own nutcrackers (pun intended). This is a ticketed event, so don't wait to buy yours!

Skating Under The Bentway

Skating under a prominent highway may seem overstimulating, but the joy and camaraderie felt from everyone around will envelope you and your partner as you glide hand in hand along the 220m figure-eight trail under the Gardiner. Open from December 16th, 2023, to February 19th, 2024, this is a newer attraction, and one that quickly became a local favourite.



An added bonus – it's totally free! Especially at a time where financial concerns weigh on many of us, some free-spirited fun followed by an intimate dinner or drinks sounds like a real win.

If your partner is less than elegant on ice skates, that makes it even better! Think of all the classic romcoms where couples skate under falling snow, with one leading the other, stopping to stick out their tongues to catch a snowflake. Support is the foundation of any healthy relationship, so why not start in the most Canadian way possible - on the ice!

Coffee and Delysees in Yorkville

Building on the delightful skating suggestion, for all you sweet-toothed sweeties out there, head to Yorkville for a classy coffee date at <u>Delysees</u>. From beautifully crafted extravagant cakes to sweet macarons and buttery croissants, go ahead and treat yourself and your date. You both deserve it, honey! After all, you just went skating for free, why not splurge at a luxury bakery and take in the style and culture of Yorkville?

Finding Love Through Gaming

Calling all gamers, here's a fun, active idea for a date that combines a healthy dose of competition with the warmth of reminiscence! Check out Zed80 arcade bar on the Danforth, an intimate arcade bar that whisks you back to the amazing years of the early 1990s to 2000s. It's a really great way to interact with your date in a relaxed indoor setting, be silly together, and check-out each other's competitive and playful sides.

Winter Wonderland Romance

You've probably seen all those posts on Instagram of couples under a huge, illuminated heart. Open until January 7th, the <u>Distillery Winter Village</u> is a staple destination for all things Christmas and lights and romance! Immerse yourself in a wintery dream with your lover, strolling through the beautifully curated winter wonderland. Get into the spirit of the season with holiday-inspired drinks (mulled wine, anyone?), delicious food from diverse food carts, and live entertainment from talented local artists. Tickets are required for entry on Friday to Sundays from 4:00 p.m., and from December 18-31 after 4:00 p.m.

Fall in Love with Candle-making

Being so uniquely us within the 2SLGBTQIA+ community, why not stray from the ordinary and partake in a unique date experience? Here is an



amazing activity to get your creative sides turned on together. <u>Kandl</u> is a relatively new family-owned business in Yorkville. In their lab, you can create your very own personalized fragrance candle.

As we get closer to the holidays, create your very own unique scented candle that captures the smells of winter and highlights your shared tastes. More than merely just a date, the two of you will leave the lab feeling all the more knowledgeable and closer to one another than when you entered. Plus, aren't certain scents known to be aphrodisiacs? That'll certainly add an extra layer of intimacy to this experience!

Snow tubing

This one is a favourite. Hang on tight to your bae in a personal tube and slide down a steep slope together, falling over and rolling into one another into the snowy abyss – cue the romcom scene again!

While this activity can't be found in downtown Toronto, there are many ski and snow tubing hills in and around the GTA which are easily accessible by car. Horseshoe Resort in Barrie is the Kween of slopes, featuring Ontario's longest snow tubing hill. A little over an hour from Toronto, this destination offers skiing as well, giving you options for a whole

day of fun! Tickets do need to be purchased in advance.

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Malta is one of those places that many travellers hear about for its mysterious allure, yet often put off visiting to pursue a more traditional tourist destination.

It has an almost mystical appeal with its remote Mediterranean island location situated between Europe and Africa, thousands of years of history to explore, temperate year-round climates and abundance of sunshine, and modern amenities that equal those found in other European countries. They also are well advanced with LGBTQ+ rights, and recently played host to **EuroPride** this past fall taking place in the capital city of Valletta.

The fortified city of Valletta is one of European Union's smallest capital cities, and one of the youngest, with many buildings having a strong Baroque character. It's built on a peninsula, between two large natural harbours, Grand Harbour on the eastern side, and Marsamxett Harbour to the west – designated as a UNESCO World Heritage site in 1980

City Gate is the main entry point, which leads to the bustling cosmopolitan Republic Street, and the more subdued Merchants Street, with smaller, independent shops and cafes. Be sure to check out the Manoel Theatre, one of the oldest still active theatres in Europe. The Upper Barrakka Gardens provides great views over Grand Harbour, and down below is where the firing of the guns at the Saluting Battery takes place daily at noon and 4:00pm. There are many walking tours and harbour boat tours that provide different perspectives, and St. John's Square is a good people watching area.

EuroPride and Queer Malta

Malta recently hosted EuroPride with attendance far surpassing their annual Pride celebrations, originally organized by Malta LGBTIQ Rights Movement in 2004 with just 50 individuals in attendance. Events



took place in varying places, with most centred within or around Valletta, including the closing weekend EuroVision and Christina Aguilera showcased at the open-air square, Granaries in Floriana. While there isn't necessarily a permanent gay bar on the island, there are several queer-friendly places that regularly host events put on by local queer promoters. The final day of festivities included the relaxed Pride Around the Grand Harbour boat parade.

Michelangelo promotes itself as a gay club, offering two levels of fun, including a lounge area and private rooms, along with special event showcases. It's located in the Paceville area, known for its bars and late-night partying. LOLLIPOP has been slaying the local club scene since 2016, by merging pop culture and fashion together at their monthly pop-up club nights. Nerve combines both top European DJs with local queer talents to create a truly inclusive party vibe. Local drag performer Coco Bordell also hosts special events, including Coco's Klabb Kabaret, which took place at the outdoor bar Uno during EuroPride.

The <u>C&R Shop and Cafe</u> in Naxxar is a must visit for both the incredible fashion items, as well as the delectable pastries in the adjacent cafe. Charles and Ron (C&R) met in Amsterdam back in 1992 and stayed in contact until Ron decided to move to Malta to be with Charles, a self-made couture maker. The pair eventually wed, being one of the first same-sex couples married there, and now together they run Malta's leading fashion brand. Their signature



style draws inspiration from the archipelago, with Mediterranean motifs, colours and stories featuring in all their collections, making any item a great souvenir piece from the island. Their brand has been worn by the likes of Ariana Grande, Carrie Underwood, Paula Abdul, Kelly Rowland, Brandy, Lauryn Hill, Michelle Williams (Destiny's Child), and many others.

Outdoor Adventures

Outside of the capital, there's plenty more to explore. The <u>Blue Grotto</u> is a series of sea caves located along the Southeastern part of the country, that can be experienced by way of traditional Maltese fishing boat tours. The vibrant azure and cobalt-coloured waters, along with the phosphorescent orange, purple, and green colours of the underwater flora, make this a mesmerizing scene of light and colour.

For those more inclined to experience a bit of outdoor adrenaline, check out MC Adventure, who offers a variety of thrilling activities, including ziplining, rock climbing, biking, and much more. Their events and locations are quite sporadic and pop up almost anywhere on the island – check their upcoming events page for what's happening during your visit, and explore other outdoor adventures as well.

A Rural Maltese Experience

For those seeking a more relaxed holiday experience, <u>Mulberries Hotel</u> might be what you're looking for. It's a traditional-style family-run rural farmhouse



that's located between the quaint village of Żabbar and the picturesque Marsascala Bay. Żabbar's historical centre is easily reachable on foot within 15 minutes, and is one of Malta's oldest residential areas, offering plenty of dining options, and a great cultural experience including historic architectural building and museums. There's also a supermarket across the street from the hotel, and public transit stops directly in front, enabling you to easily visit the surrounding areas. You can also take a local ferry from the nearby Three Cities to the Grand Harbour in Valletta in under ten minutes. Recently, the property opened their Wellness Haven, featuring an indoor swimming pool, whirlpool, sauna, and aromatherapy steam room. If you're looking for a more urban experience, there are several gay-friendly/owned accommodation options.

Getting There with Flying Colours

Despite its more remote location, it still has good connectivity from most European destinations with flights arriving at Malta International Airport, which is located in Luqa, just 15 minutes from the capital of Valletta. In fact, most anywhere you want to go on the island can be done within an hour's drive at most, making it easy to cover a lot of territory in little time.

Germany's <u>Condor</u> airline recently introduced their new ultra-modern long-haul A330-900neo aircraft, offering significantly enhanced sense of space,



first-class in-flight entertainment and connectivity in all classes when flying internationally. The airline also made concerted efforts to embrace diversity and engage with the LGBTQ+ community, by participating and promoting Pride celebrations within Germany and beyond. They've even held Pride Flights with an all-female cockpit crew, and gay male cabin crew with rainbow accessories. With their hub in Frankfurt, connecting worldwide is made easy, and both Prime and Business Class tickets are priced at much lower prices that other carriers, and include access to Plaza Premium Lounges.

After gaining international acclaim, people enquired when he would move to a 'real' art centre like New York or Berlin. "I love visiting these cities, but Toronto is the place where my work emerges. It seemed to such people that an international career was a key to escape a place like Toronto. I never saw things that way," Luis explains. "One of the eggs I'm currently keeping warm is a book project to write a history of art in Toronto. Fingers crossed it hatches

Another of his current projects is a collection of drawings depicting variations on an ominous finger pointing at a shower drain, a seemingly benign concept made equivocally sensual through the lens of a queer artist. "It's tricky to make an image of a thing that is not a thing. What happens if we look at this drain? The finger points the way. But the drain being a point or hole that drains elsewhere - insists, here, but not quite here. It signals a deferral that also activates something. I believe there is a perverse pleasure to be had in these drawings."

The methods he uses to frame his art are often as intentional and affecting as the art itself. His ability to destabilize conventions of viewing and invite what he calls a "collision of meanings" threads a connection between the seemingly incompatible styles he works in. He goes on to explain, "This collision is most important to me. (It) derives from my identity as a queer person. I entered adulthood in the time of AIDS and the militancy of Queer Nation. This was a moment when queerness was something that did not want to be included, celebrated, or represented - queerness wanted to

transform society, rather than be handed a piece of its pie. This contrarian aspect of queerness guides me to this day."














Where The Boys Are: Murder, Martinis, and Mayhem... Boys Will Be Boys, is a hidden gem from Christopher Murphy, a new voice in the 2SLGBTQIA+ fiction genre.

A moody melody hangs in the air, like incense, as Quinn Harris deflates onto his mat. He's surrounded by a gang of sweaty blonde Stepford wives wearing ironic tank tops with sayings like SLAY ALL DAY. Behind them are a few stragglers mixed among the usual 5:30 yoga class. He can't stop thinking about a dream he's had the night before. He vividly recalls being in Paris, where even the air itself smelled different - full of pastry flour. The entire dream was in black and white, and he was speaking French, which is especially odd considering he doesn't speak French at all. It couldn't have been actual French, he realizes now. Just his mind's idea of what French might sound like in a dream. He's struggling to remember more details, struggling to weave the fragments into a clear picture. He vaguely recalls sitting in a bar at one point. There were televisions

on the walls playing sports and the entire space was poorly lit but somehow felt comforting and safe, like a womb. It felt as if he'd been there before, although he's sure he hasn't. He's never left the East Coast, let alone stepped foot in France.

"Breathe in relaxation... exhale your tension..." Giselle whispers for the hundredth time, cutting into his thoughts.

The class lies completely still with closed eyelids, spread out like corpses on the bamboo floor. Bodies defeated by too many Downward-Facing Dogs and ready to be outlined with chalk. "Let your worries and stress from the day sink into the mat," Giselle's placid voice circles the room. Quinn takes the opportunity to sneak a peek at Tomas. He lies across from Quinn looking peaceful and enticing with sweat glazing his arms. Tomas is one-part golden skin, one-part gray eyes, with dreadlocks he keeps tied up in a messy bun. His loose graphic tee and shorts do a poor job of hiding his toned physique. Every Downward-Facing Dog reveals strong soccer legs and granite abs. Every Bal asana pose highlights his curvy glutes. Quinn can think of hundreds of yoga-inspired positions he'd love to put Tomas in.

The Naughty Ostrich.
The Raging Bull.
If only he had the guts to talk to him after class.

It's been 40 years since ACT was formed by a small group of community activists during the summer of 1983 as the AIDS Committee of Toronto. AIDS had first entered public consciousness in the summer of 1981, as a "rare cancer" found in 41 gay men in New York and San Francisco. The first Canadian case was reported nine months later, in March of 1982. Little was known about this new disease; but, fear, hysteria, and stigma surrounded it, and a diagnosis of HIV/AIDS was a death sentence, with the average life expectancy being just nine months. That was nine lonely months as many relatives and friends turned their backs – and so did many members of the medical profession.

Gay men in Toronto were beginning to fall ill with AIDS – with little recourse to effective, supportive health care, they often died quickly. As local media began to publish more fear-mongering articles about AIDS, The Body Politic, a gay and lesbian news magazine in Toronto, began running articles by gay activist Michael Lynch and epidemiologist Bill Lewis to counter the misinformation.

One of the first stories *The Body Politic* published about AIDS was titled, "*AIDS: discounting the promiscuity theory*." Written by Bill Lewis, it was a radical departure from the messages provided by U.S. gay activists. In the US, activists were touting a theory that promiscuity was causing men to overload their bodies with common sexually transmitted infections, thus eroding their immune systems.

At this early time, the HIV virus, which causes AIDS, had not yet been discovered, though there was enough evidence to illustrate that the virus was being

transmitted through the blood, and through needle use. It was apparent that a single exposure could be enough to transmit the disease. The "Promiscuity Theory" was looking more like morality trying to pass itself off as science – without evidence.

In March of 1983, the Canadian Red Cross contacted the editor of *The Body Politic*, seeking guidance on messaging about AIDS and blood donation. Recognizing the need for clear and accurate messaging, this magazine editor organized a meeting of himself and nine other activists and professionals, including a representative of the Hassle Free Clinic. They not only formulated the necessary public statement about blood donations, but also began to plan for an entity that would provide ongoing support for people with AIDS. This was the first meeting of what would become the AIDS Committee of Toronto.

Since that time, ACT has worked to reduce new HIV infections in Toronto and promote the independence, dignity, health, and well-being of people living with HIV/AIDS, and those at increased risk. ACT offers social programs, counseling, youth outreach, support groups, and HIV testing.

If you would like to support ACT, you can become a member, helping to influence activities and programs by voting at meetings; you can volunteer, following an intensive 20-hour core skills training program; you can donate a one-time gift, or an ongoing financial contribution; you can name ACT as a beneficiary to your estate. Maybe, with your help, we can reach the goal of zero new HIV infections.



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hat is it about "the gays" that so binds them to the creative impulse, particularly in the realm of fashion?

Fashion itself is a complex intersection of presentation, cultural expression, social commentary, and crafted artifice. It is this last element that perhaps speaks most directly to homosexual realities.

Although modern society has evolved to extend a modicum of acceptance to those whose orientation deviates from "the norm," there remains an assortment of stigmas, biases, and discomforts that often necessitate a certain amount of self-protecting artifice in how queers present themselves to the world.

From leather daddies to drag queens, the deliberate, conscious attempt to shape perception lies at the heart of an almost tribal impulse to display identifiers that connect with one's social group.

We can compare and contrast fashion versus style in this context. Where fashion is, by definition, focused on outward presentation, often with commercial intent, style addresses the personal, individual expression of one's world view, unique identity, and visual signature. We can purchase fashion, but style is something innate. You can attempt to copy another's style, but merely executing some form of mimcry does not, by itself, generate your own unique style. Personal style, by definition, is *personal*. We

can assimilate aspects of others' style, but how we interpret, execute and commit to that assimilation is what drives true self-expression.

At a meta level, queer style expression is an invitation to everyone to explore and express their personal style without fear of censure or criticism. By exhibiting a degree of confidence and fearlessness, queer style creates safer spaces for self-expression for everyone.

That invitation to expressive freedom extends beyond fashion and style to interior design and other creative endeavours. A Chinese red dining room? Why not? Framed prints of 1920s erotic photography in the bathroom? WHY NOT?

Perhaps this is the central message we're trying to communicate. Instead of asking yourself, "Can I do this?" we could emphatically ask ourselves, "WHY NOT?" You have nothing to lose but your insecurity.
